

Making Portraits from Paper, Colors, Boxes and Paper Bags at Golden Road Arts

1. Overview

- a. In this lesson, we continue our theme of making art from materials you have in your home. Artist and educator Barbara Mason demonstrates a simple craft that allows children to both construct and create art using crayons, markers, paper, cardboard boxes, paper bags, scissors, tape and glue. Learn how to curl paper and wrap a present in this lesson as well.
- b. Grade level: Kidergarten-5th Grade
- c. Vocabulary

2. Why do we draw portraits?

a. This lesson is teaching us not only to observe but we are also learning a lot of hand-eye coordination. It is interesting to note that before the invention of photography, a painted, sculpted, or drawn portrait was the only way to record the appearance of someone. Portraits have always been more than just a record. They have also been used to show the power, importance, virtue, beauty, wealth, taste, learning or other qualities of the sitter.

3. Fun Facts

- a. The purpose of a portrait is to show the likeness, personality and even the mood of the person or animal.
- b. Generally, human eyes are halfway down the head when drawing a face.
- c. The edges of the nostrils on a face line up with the tear ducts of the eyes.
- d. The space between the eyes is approximately the width of an eye.
- e. The head is about five eyes wide.
- f. The corners of the mouth line up with the pupils of the eyes.

4. Lesson Plan

- a. Elements of Art: line, shape, form, space, texture
- b. Principles of Art: rhythm, balance, emphasis, proportion, gradation, harmony, variety, movement
- c. Visualization
 - i. What shapes do you recognize in your drawings?
 - ii. How does one portrait differ from another?
 - iii. How is your portrait 2/D?
 - iv. How is your portrait 3/D?
- d. Goals and Objectives
 - i. Students will observe and understand the process of to create their portraits.
 - ii. Students will understand how shapes are similar and different in their drawings.
 - iii. Students will use hand-eye skills in cutting, coloring and gluing their portraits. They will also use these skills in wrapping the box with paper.
